



## Our Flag pole's 25<sup>th</sup> birthday

We often take our flag pole for granted, giving it a cursory glance as we drive into town. We don't realise that a dedicated crew of volunteer monitors maintain and change the flags when needed.

Jack Dickenson and Robert Whiter have performed this role faithfully for 25 years.

Many may have wondered about the decorative silver bow seen here at its base. It signified the important 25 year milestone celebrating the silver anniversary of the flag

pole. On Tuesday March the 13<sup>th</sup> Sue Williamson, daughter of one of Eden's harbour masters, and Eden resident Neil Rankin cut the birthday cake and joined those present in sharing stories of the 1993 community project which raised the funds for the flag pole and saw it installed.

The EKWM houses the extensive collection of flags in monthly boxes with a diary which details which flags are to be flown each day.

Many international flags are stored and flown and

when the cruise ships are in port you will notice their flags are flown as well.

Museum curator Jody White commented that 'the flag mast is a wonderful example of reusing the items of historical value for a new purpose. It continues its long tradition of signaling to locals and tourists alike.'



## James Kirwan – an Eden convict landowner

At February's curatorial meeting this new document relating to the purchase of Lot 3, Section 1 on Imlay Street by James Kirwan, issued on 31 July 1843, was donated. The purchase document is signed bottom right by the NSW Governor, George Gipps.

The land is now owned by EKWM volunteers Tricia and Richard Lamcraft, picture near the displayed document. James Kirwan, from County Mayo Ireland, sentenced to seven years for stealing money, was transported in 1826 to New South Wales sailing with 200 other convicts on the 'Boyne'. His occupation at the time of his conviction was that of a gentleman's servant. On his arrival at Port Jackson he was assigned to Jno. Seary stationed at the Military Garden. James Kirwan is a name indelibly associated with the early history of Monaro. He was married to Elizabeth, a sister of Joseph Ward, who in

1836 had sent William Glanville to Sydney with a consignment of cattle. Kirwan, having thus heard of Monaro, was determined to start a business there, and arranged for his supplies to be taken back by Glanville. Kirwan, in partnership with Ward, wanted his wife to accompany him. The Ward family objected to Mrs. Kirwan going where there were no white women had been. Kirwan was insistent, and Ward, a passionate man, brought his axe down on the wheel of the dray containing the partnership goods, and cutting three spokes out said, "I'll have my half." The wheel was bound up with clothes-line, and Glanville brought the dray along with a composite team of a mare in the shafts, a bull by the name of "Spot," and a bullock called "Tinker" leading. Kirwan, coming to Monaro, became a hawker, making a considerable amount of money. At the junction of the

Cooma and Cooma Back Creeks he opened the first place of accommodation in the district, known far and wide as Kirwan's Inn. By special permission he purchased an area of 160 acres adjoining the boundaries of the village of Cooma. In October, 1852 he was shot by his groom - a man named McSpladden - whilst inquiring into the cause of a quarrel between the latter and a doctor, a guest at the inn. His wife, a capable and educated woman, looked after his books. She predeceased him, dying in October, 1850, at the age of 36. James Kirwan was the lessee of the Cooma Run, of 30,000 acres, the Countegany Run, of 20,000 acres, and acquired from Jeremiah Flinn the Numeralla Run, of 2,140 acres. **Transcribed by Patrick Mould in 2003, from the book "Back to Cooma" Celebrations"**

## Eden's Historic school of the Arts


A recent donation to the Museum has provided more information about the establishment of the School of Arts Hall in Eden. The Indenture document, reveals the two trustees of the Eden School of Arts to be Alexander Walker Davidson and Charles Tarlinton Stiles. Alexander, of course, being the patriarch of the Davidson family associated with our well documented whaling history. The Indenture shows Messrs Willis and Eden storekeeper/entrepreneur, Solomon Solomon selling the land for £100. No records have yet been found as yet to confirm when the School of Arts committee was established but the building contract was awarded to Mr C Jess of Wyndham. The

official opening took place on 24 May 1894 with St Joseph's convent school students holding a concert in November. In 1899, the committee's annual report noted the building had been painted and a water supply provided at a cost of £30. The outgoing committee recommended that the interior of the hall be at least partly lined to increase the comfort of users, and provide more room for the library. The reading room had closed due to poor patronage. The library was popular with users, with 1191 books issued throughout the year.

Alterations, completed in 1901, included partly lining the hall and direct access created from the hall to the refreshment and library rooms. A new building

was proposed at a meeting in May 1902 but it is unclear about any further action on this motion. The hall was a town meeting place, used as a venue to hear state election candidates, for balls, and all types of recreational activities, including table tennis and later, roller skating. An 1910 advert in The Magnet newspaper announced that the 'latest and most up-to-date films procurable...refined, instructive, educating and amusing with incidental music' would be shown on 21 December with prices at 1/6 and 1/-, children at half price. From the late 1940s picture shows run by Viv Cocks and Rod Bourke were popular, and a kiosk for sweet treats was operated by the RSL. By this time the hall was starting to fall into disrepair and in 1976 councillors resolved to have the School of Arts building demolished.

**David O'Connor – a sadly missed friend**

It was with much sadness that I recently learned that our talented EKWM friend David O'Connor had passed away after a short illness.

Many will remember him as an enthralling guest speaker who gave us an insight into his five years in Mongolia (see Soundings 6.4).

David an actor, poet, singer, songwriter, radio and TV newsreader and presenter was born in England.

Australia became David's home base though he had lived in Laos and travelled to over 45 countries. Leaving England in 1967 he intended to hitchhike around the world, but with just \$2 in his pocket stopped in Australia.

In 1976 he joined a theatre company in Tasmania and then, with the actors who were also musicians, formed a band called Auntie's Gift.

David released 11 CD's and his songs have been recorded by Fay White, Bernard Carney and Jackie Luke. He travelled Australia in his little campervan performing his bush poetry and music at many festivals.

He also entertained children with magic tricks performing in schools in each state.

In 2014 "*This other Eden*", a collection of poems compiled and produced by David, featured his poems and those of selected local poets. It quickly sold out.

Most of us were unaware of his philanthropic side and just how much he contributed to fostering youngsters and causes throughout the world. He

counted his work on behalf of Australian Volunteers International as being the most worthwhile and rewarding experiences of his life.

While in Mongolia David met a lady trying to find a piano for a kindergarten, he decided to donate an electric keyboard then started fund raising in Tasmania until the school was completely re-built. Up until his death he continued to provide funds for children to finish their schooling and acted as a translator for Mongolian journalists. We will all miss this wonderful multi-talented man. He was a very special bloke who quietly made a huge difference to the lives of many people, giving pleasure through both his music and his writing.
