Besides being in private consulting, Greg is working for BVSC, taking over the role, recently vacated by Angela. He specialises in gallery design (only). Other trades take over any building work required. So, we are negotiating with Greg to maybe have him design the whaling gallery.

When the whaling area is settled, the now Davidson Gallery will become a visual arts area. We see this, quite apart from an area to exhibit our fine collection of works, as a place where, on arrival, people can find the comfort of the building, use the facilities and sit while either enjoying such works or regrouping with family or friends.
