More from Trove THE EDEN MAGNET 1939 Killer Museum Committee

At a meeting of the Eden Killer Museum Committee on Tuesday afternoon, there were present Messrs J. Turnbull. A.I. Nicholson, G. Strickland, and G.R. Phillipps, Hon. Sec. Mr. Turnbull was voted to the chair.

Following the confirmation of the minutes, it was resolved to place on record the Committee's regret at the loss of the President, Mr. J. R. Logan and convey to Mrs. Logan the committee's sympathy with them, in their bereavement. The motion was carried by members standing in silence.

The treasurer reported a credit balance in the Commonwealth Savings Bank of \pm 77/6/1 and cash collections in the hands of the chairman amounted to 16/6, the total being \pm 78/2/7.

It was considered that in order to provide for the removal and re-erection of the Killer's skeleton, a few pounds should be reserved and it was resolved to ask the Shire Council as trustees of the Museum reserve, to prepare plans for a building for which it would have available from another source the sum of £200 which, with £70 to be handed over by the committee, might be sufficient to enable the construction of a building large enough for initial requirements.

It was resolved that Mr. J. Turnbull be president in place of Mr. Logan, deceased and authorised to operate with the secretary, on the committee's banking account, the Commonwealth Bank to be notified accordingly.

It was decided to to ask the Council to have the building plan, before final adoption, submitted to the committee for inspection and expression of its views and possible suggestion..... Thanks to Rob for the old newspaper cuttings.

Another expensive, but necessary milepost is behind us with the receipt of the fire safety compliance certificate received.

With a much greater floorspace than ever and requirements (rightly) more stringent, the Board took the decision not to do the job just as being adequate, but to do a job that will see our clients as safe as we can foresee, for decades to come.

So fifteen thousand dollars later, we are well satisfied with the completed work carried out by local firm, Eden Glass.

When you are in the Museum, check the doors out. They are always unlocked from inside. Notwithstanding that, don't get caught and exit with the expectation that the lock being free inside, it will be so on the outside, because of necessity it will be secure from the outside.

Particularly familiarise yourself with the doors from Founders to the deck. It's early days and deck doors have ben propped open. We have removed the propping articles. The doors are to be left in the self-closing mode.

You will also note that some are just infilled with white sheeting. These doors have been deliberately finished in this manner with both the reduction of light entry and the further bonus of being easy to find in th event of an emergency that might happen in a poor light situation, or one that creates is own cloud. A move to be appreciated by thosewith a sight disability.

It can be easy to not appreciate the disability of another. When time or circumstance changes your own abilities, you become particularly aware
