Tom's Global Ventures

Just on 93 years since the last of the last killer whale packs which visited Eden annually, was found floating in Twofold Bay. How long had they presented themselves here is not known, but the mystery and the myth endues nearly a century on. There has been thousands of column inches written, photographs and movies and videos displayed, doubts cast on the veracity of the story, but the intrigue endues and will continue to do so.

Back in the early eighties when all things whale began its international interest was increasing, EKWM was approached by a Canadian institution to see if we would lend a tooth from the skeleton, that they might slice it to reveal the "growth rings", similar to that of a tree".

As there were many differences of opinion as to what age Tom may have been at death, we were keen to engage with this reputable body. The expected age of an orca and the folk lore age, dating of him back into indigenous familiarities, were it might be said, oceans apart

Keen though we were, we were also very apprehensive having had been burned by an earlier experience. It was still fresh in the memory at the time I joined, in the mid-seventies... Many will remember Bill Peach's show on the ABC (TDT?). His crew sought of Bert Egan, the loan of an implement to use as a prop for a story on T.F Bay whaling. Bert also thought that as a good reputation had preceded the event, it would be safe to make the loan. The piece was never seen by us, again and left Bert with a good dose of 'the guilts".

With the foregoing firmly in mind, we agreed to the loan of the tooth and the work with it. Many undertakings were given as to the security and the **return** of the piece

and the result of the investigation. Surely these undertakings would be safe. Well, in the event, as the months ticked by and the mail vacant of any package adoring a Canadian stamp, we began with what turned out to be a lengthy exchange of views with the borrowers. We did eventually, get it back. The Canadians seemed quite peeved that we had asked for the return of our property We reminded them of their initial undertakings. When the report was received, it could be said that there was some discrepancy. In one of the calls seeking return of the sample, I was advised that they were not able to

offer a definitive result as the compression of the dentine was such that prohibited a finding. The written report received afterwards

qualified this with the words"we estimate Old



“GAILY DECORATED FLOATS MAKE A FINE SPECTACLE”

This was the way the Magnet & Voice saw the float parade and celebrations, the day piped water was turned on, for the folk of Eden, October 1956.

“Those who gave their time and energy to the construction of floats for the procession on Tantawanglo day, must have felt a glow of pride and satisfaction as the large number of gaily decorated floats proceeded slowly along the route to the sports ground.

The day’s celebrations commenced when Clr. F.G. Clare, gave the signal for the first of the large array of assembled in Bass Street, to begin the parade.

A large crowd lined the streets and most were agreeably surprised of the number and evident amount of work, which had been necessary to produce such a fine array of floats.

One visitor from Bega was heard to say that the procession compared more than favourably with a similar procession held in that town recently.

The procession proceeded to Imlay Park for the ceremony and then on to Beach Reserve where the floats circled the arena several times, while the judges made their decisions.

School children from the various schools in the district led by the Bega Band, joined the procession.

FLOATS TAKING PART

Floats taking part in their various sections were:-

Humorous; Towamba (The Good Old days). Ray Innes and Ray Turnbull; (Horse drawn hearse). Eden RSL (The Battalion band.) Balmain Bros Bega (Bus service). Tathra Urban Committee (Tathra water supply).

Mr F. Davidson (Tathra Water 1885?). Whitby’s Service Station (Pambula emergency water supply). Mr N. Hanson, (Painters accident).

Decorative: The Showroom , Eden (Beach Scene) Capt. D Williamson, (Pirate Boys), Eden Advancement Association. (Wake up!),

Commercial:- Eden Canneries (Tuna Industry), Merimbula Bacon Factory, (Products Display), Cock Bros, (Atlantic Petrol), Whiter’ Southern Motors, (Cars), Advanx (Tyres), Eden Ambulance (Car accident Scene with old ambulance in attendance, followed by the new ambulance chassis and cab, with

the inscription “I aint got no body but your donation will help build it”.

Historic: Hotel Eden (Whaling Days)

The judges had a difficult task in selecting the various winners and most floats were worthy of a prize. The final decisions went to the following

Humorous; Towamba, the good Old days. This depicted a pioneer living room “with baby”. Ruf. Lucas ws in the bath with Bert Daley as “mother”, vigorously applying the scrubbing brush. ‘Granny”, Alf Piesley, was sedately knitting . While the “old maid” (Charlie Page) was busy with her washing chores This float caused shrieks of laughter and was organised by Mrs George Dickie and friends.

Commercial: Merimbula Bacon Factory. This was painstakingly arranged and featured all products of the factory, with four secretaries taking orders.

Special mention must be made in this section to Eden Canneries float, advertising the tuna industry.

Decorative: The Showroom float “holidays in Eden”, which depicted a beach scene with a bathing pool in the centre and complete with beach inspector, bathing beauties and beach boys.

Historic. The Eden Hotel’s float “Whaling Days” showed what could be done in a very short time . The boat was still in the water at 9AM and transformed to a whaling boat complete with crew and whaling gear.
