ABOUT SEHGI

One trouble with familiarity, in small communities, is that it is often easy to overlook the fact that the other party may not have knowledge of a local subject under discussion.

I further thought that some of our people must wonder what the dickens are we talking about when we talk of an organisation with the strange acronym, SEHGI. With this in mind, I thought I would give a potted history of the group.

SEGHI it took its rise about forty years ago under the auspices of Museum's Australia.

Berti Egan and I attended a meeting of Museums Aust NSW, at Wollongong, towards the end of the seventies.

Representatives of regional museums were invited. It was said at the time, that it was the first meeting of that organisation to be held outside a capital city. Regional chapters were formed. We became the S.E. Chapter

to be largely autonomous, with direct access to M.A., aimed at support and advocacy. In some areas their continuity did not last. In our corner of the world, our lot has never faulted, with few quarterly meetings missed. Recent events of the pandemic and monster bushfires, rained on our parade and sullied our meeting record like no other.

With monotonous regularity, the subject of boundaries was on our agenda. Initially, Braidwood was at the ex-

tremity of our territory and we were not aware of any meeting held north of Cobargo. in that town.

Another of my old cobbers, Beryl Bowler OBE, came with me to a very early chapter a meeting at Moruya. It was obvious even in those early days that the tyrranny of dis-

The boundary eventually settled on representatives from Berridale, Cooma, Bombala, Cobargo, Bermagui, Merimbula, Bega Pambula and Eden. Though across that line the map, Mallacoota accepted our invitation to join us.

I venture to offer, but there could be a case for a look at the boundaries again. Sure the roads are better but the distances are no shorter and I further venture, the average age of the participants, are even further up the scale than they were at the outset. The amalgamation of local government areas too, can have a bearing on the cover on an organisation such as SEHGI.

The autonomy worked well for twenty odd years. Without forewarning, M.A. decided they would take over whatever funds the Chapters held and apply to them when we wanted to spend some of our own money. None of the cash we held had had originated from M.A

Laden down by riches (we had about \$600) we agreed they could take a running jump (among other crudities) and we would go it alone. We felt bold enough to determine we could manage all that money. It was also noted that as far as support and advocacy, it was left somewhat wanting.

With a name being required, that chosen was suggested by staunch supporter, Shirley Bazley. This was followed by incorporation.

A further milestone was when the state government decided to combine all the visual arts and collecting institution matters, funding etc. would come under the one body styled, Museums and Galleries NSW. No doubt this was a money saving episode. It was oft repeated that it was a manoeuvre to lessen the cash pie and cut what remained to favour a particular branch of the arts, which had lobbied strongly for such outcome.

So in a way, we were ahead of the pack, believing we had little to lose. The organisation has endured for nearly half a century. Great friendships have been formed, knowledge exchanged and fellow groups respected. It speaks for itself.

Il A Sunday gold rush.... In 1976 I was the entertainment arranger for Lodge Baddeley, which group was where I first met Berti Egan. Never short of a yarn. Bert would speak of Yambulla gold mine and as a young bloke; prior to WW1, he would work with his father who had a bullock team. Egan Sr had an understanding (which was all you needed in that era) to keep the mining camp provided with its needs. He told of Mrs Hite, some of whose descendants remain in Eden, who operated a boarding house.

There was no liquor licence. Unimaginable is a mining camp without booze Mrs Hite, being an astute business woman, offered a free beer with every orange bought.

The beer flowed. I doubt if much of the very healthy orange juice, did. I have often thought how much of Mr Egan's wagon space was given over to oranges and how much to alcohol. Then again, Mrs Hite may have re-purchased un-used oranges at a favourable price. The lady could go down in history as the original recycler!

So with Bert as guide, I set to organise the day and made it open to anyone that was interested. Yambulla had been abandoned for decades. Before the Forestry Commission undertook its major road building programme which included the Imlay Road. the "roads" were just tracks. There were probably some who took one I;ook at the tracks rather regretted their decision to join us.

The stampers in the background remained in situ for several more decades There were attempts to open the mine up again, but the price per ounce seemed to always sink just as it was reaching an equitable level, that would allow the project to get underway. Fred Dawson of Wonboyn and Les Strickland of Eden were among those who I knew, who were interested at "firing the old site up".

Photo (b) gives an idea of the support the trip received. The creek crossing was a no bridge too far, for some. The bloke in the shorts and back to the camera is Peter Keough. Peter was a very talented manufacturing jeweller who came to Eden from north

Sydney. His shop was in Imlay St around about where Mark Anthony's apparel shop is today. Pete came here through friendship of the Cedric and Thelma Cocks family. He was funny, generous

mann and an active member of Apex. An all round great citizen of the town. He traded here for about ten years then moved to Dubbo. Sadly he passed away while still relatively young.

With the Committee's blessing, I asked Peter would he design and quote on an appropriate life member's badge for presentation to Bert Egan. He did neither. Instead he designed and crafted a magnificent jewell, commensurate with the esteem in which he, we

and the town. held Bert Egan. Gold and silver were the choice of material Peter used. When it came to the payment side

of things, there would not be one. He would not even discuss the matter. The engraving on the front says EDEN KILLER WHALE AND HISTORICAL SOCIE-TY.....LIFE MEMBER. On the back of the boat; Bert Egan ... 22-4-1978, The pattern has been adopted for life member badges for those who have followed.

George Staley, a respected President of this organisation, was Peter's protégé and went on to acquire the business. It was there that his daughter, Georgina became fascinated with the trade and now has a chain of jewellery stores across the far south coast. And as the circle of life engages its wont, Peter's middle son, Kord, manages the Bateman's Bay branch of Georgie's Jewellery, where I was really pleased to catch up with him.
