

Passing of Dr Alex Ritchie

Maintaining the Home Base

Foremost palaeontologist , D. Alexander Ritchie, passed away in Sydney, recently.

Scottish born, near Edinburgh, Dr Richie was the first member of his family to seek tertiary studies. He graduated from Edinburgh University with honours in geology and zoology in 1959.

His vehement opposition to apartheid caused him to not be able apply for a position in South Africa. Subsequently, he applied for and won the position of Curator of Fossils at the Australian Museum in Sydney. In 1968 he, his wife and two children set sail for Australia.

Dr Ritchie's predecessor Dr Harold Fletcher had travelled to Canowindra NSW to view some fossil slabs from the Devonian Period uncovered during road works. Several examples were taken to Sydney for study.

The specimens would lure Dr Ritchie back to Canowindra in 1993, to uncover one of the world's greatest fish fossil finds in what would be the pinnacle of his career.

Our paths crossed with Dr Ritchie when fish fossils were discovered in our own area. Excitement was abound when some removal was planned and executed.

Dr Keith Crook, with partner, Anne, were EKWM volunteers. They had accommodation in Eden for many years. They ultimately retired here and restoring the stone house, just down from the Museum. The regularly brought student groups to Eden to study local formations

Keith was liaising with Alex during the uncovering and removing some specimen rock for examination in Sydney. I well remember the excitement on that Saturday night when we wre invited d to have a look at something that was aged even further back than the Canowindra collection.

We were told that the specimen would be returned to EKWM. That did not happen but we were pleased to settle with a moulded copy. Hats off to the crew who have doubled down on the maintenance "to do" list. There are jobs now finalised that have been begging for attention but had to simmer on the back burner for a timely opportunity to present itself . The building programme, covid and staff matters all contributed in no small manner to this delay.

One big job completed was the concreting around the outside of the building.

The white stones are gone. Hooray!. Having cheered their demise I was also cheered at their placement, thirty years ago in an effort to reduce the concreted-in look. They were always a bit of a nuisance but the building of the entrance air lock exacerbated their unfriendliness. Earlier on, it

was mainly the kids who kicked and belted them about during a "boring" time waiting for Mum or Dad or Schoolteacher, or the like. After the advent of the air lock then the closure of access through the hinged door, matters became worse.
