Getting Booked

So there I was. I woke up bright eyed and bushy tailed, resolving that I WOULD tidy up and sort my bookshelves. This had been regularly suggested by my nearest and dearest. Notwithstanding that, I was fully aware of how the pathway to hell is brought about.

I set a cracking pace: Australia at war, tick. Politics. Tick. Biographies, tick,. Aust poetry well on the way. Local historyand... I picked up "Birth, Death& Marriage Notices from the Bombala Times 1912 – 1920". "Oh I forgot I had that. I'll just take a little squizzy'". Bad move.

Time sped, other duties called and yet another resolution evaporated into the ether and another slab of pavement made.

Most who know me have been made aware (adnauseam?) of my lamentations of not only the loss of locally owned and edited newspapers, but more particularly, {with the odd exception}, the treasure contained obituaries of local citizens.

None were more adept at obituaries than the Johnsons in their over half century of proprietorship of the Times. I learnt a lot of Monaro history from these writings. The last of the family, Gerry (apologies if spelling is incorrect) passed away in recent times, at Tathra, to where he had retired.

Gerry had made magnificent donations to Bombala & District Historical Society, over the years

This book of course was of pre Johnson years but it was of a great initiative B&DHS to put in the work in 1993, to bring this publication about. I knew many of the individuals who were still about in my time in the town and certainly acquainted with most of the families.

I bring it to this newsletter after being surprised at the number of connections with Eden. The way the narrative runs when compared to today's style.

The man was master. Quite often when lady was the deceased her Christian (as it was then) name was not mentioned. She was just Mrs Joe Blow.

It is a timeline on causes of death with diseases, seldom encountered today but still in adult conversation in my childhood like diphtheria and tetanus (lock jaw) and typhoid, horse accidents, gun discharges and unthinkable suicides by strychnine poison, which was readily available as used on most farms, for pest eradication .

It brings the first world war back to the home front and the Spanish flu pandemic must have been horrendous. The remoteness of where these rugged individuals lived, added to a shortened life

One entry refers to, "one of our **oldest** residents, Mr Henry Garratty passed away on Monday, **aged 78** (my emphasis).

Some extracts;-

15/8/1913 . Mr George Dunbar Davidson passed away on Wednesday at Cooma, He was born in Sydney in 1842 and was approaching his 71st birthday, a member of the noted whaling Davidson family of Eden, in which he played an active part in his early life. Coming to Monaro 46 years ago, he lived at Jindabyne, Mittagong and Boloka, afterwards carrying on a livery stable for 26 years,

10/10/1913. Mr Robert Wiles and Mrs Whalen of Bombala were married at Christ Church Pambula on Sunday morning.28th September, by Rev. R. Upjohn

24/10/ 1913The death is announced of Rev Colin Roger Greig*, one of the pioneer ministers of the Presbyterian Church. He arrived from Scotland in 1860 and was an able and eloquent preacher. For many years he laboured strenuously in the charges of Eden, Bombala, Dubbo, Hill End and Walcha

9/10/1914. Mr William Weatherhead passed away in Bega, aged 68.Born at Nangutta, a son of Alexander Weatherhead, and spent most of his life there, until about 15years ago he purchased "Naroon", the beautiful home on Newtown Road, Bega. All his family, with the exception of Mrs Everingham, were with him at the last.

25/11/1914 The news reached Eden on Tuesday of the death in Sydney of Mr. O.H. Piesley, son of Mr W. Piesley of Saltwater Creek. Cause of death-typhoid......

I trust you will find some interest in these notes. * I don't know if Rev Greig was related to the residents of that name. but do know relation ship[is here with others...... I'll run some more next month.


